## THE NOVEMBER 5th MEETING



**BILL GIBBENS** talked about the progress made integrating our Young Eagles program into a STEM program within our school systems.

His injury, requiring 23 days of travel to the nearest medical facility, inspired the idea of transporting medical help and supplies to remote villages by air. This evolved into REMOTE AREA MEDICAL. MAX BURNETTE gave a presentation on weighing your airplane and calculating Weight and Balance to determine the Center of Gravity (CG). His examples graphically illustrated how a small change in location or a lapse in attention to detail can turn a safe condition hazardous, and vice-versa.

went flying yesterday! Linwood Stevenson called me to say Sarah from the glider port had told him that the winds were good and should she bring his glider out. He called me and I looked up at a solid cloud cover that looked too low, but it has been so long since my last glider flight that I said **yes**.

I rushed home to get warm weather gear and gloves before meeting him at my hangar. We flew down in the Bonanza at 2500 feet with weather clearing as we moved closer to Chilhowee.

It was COLD. We got out and the cold bit with the winds about 10 mph, promising Ridge Lift. The glider had been brought out and made ready. I made the takeoff and headed to the ridge where we flew up to 4,000 feet with no effort. I was searching for thermals but it was just for practice. We then flew back and forth along the ridge about 10 miles in each direction of the airport. Great visibility and we roared down the ridge at about 80 mph. It was comfortable but after two hours began to feel the cold. After my landing (a little hard for my liking) we opened the canopy and the cold cut through. By the time we moved inside to pay for the tow aloft my hands were shaking so hard that I could barely write a legible check.

We got back to Meadowlake a little before sunset and packed the Bonanza away without taking the time to refuel or hook up the battery maintainer. Did I mention it was **Cold**? We met at Stoney's in Oak Ridge for dinner and made the log book entry after we had warmed up after the drive. It was great fun yesterday and I look forward to the next adventure. Thanks Linwood!

On October 20, 2018, at the Chilhowee Gliderport annual Octoberfest awards banquet, ASI Pam Charles, an FAA inspector from the Nashville Flight Standards District Office stopped by.

She presented Linwood Stevenson with FAA's Wright Brothers "Master Pilot" award in recognition of his over 50 years (55 actually) of safe aviation pilot activity. Chapter 17 can be proud to have this caliber of aviations in our community.

The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award is the most prestigious award the FAA

issues to pilots certified under part 61. This award is named after the Wright Brothers, the first US pilots, to recognize individuals who have exhibited professionalism, skill, and aviation expertise for at least 50 years while piloting aircraft as "Master Pilots".

A distinctive certificate and lapel pin is issued after application review and eligibility requirements have

been met. Once the award has been issued, the recipient's name, city and state will be added to a published "Roll of Honor" located at <u>www.faasafety.gov/</u>.
