THE FEBRUARY MEETING

featured SARAH ARNOLD, who runs the Chilhowee Gliderport at (92A) (65 miles SW, below Athens). She has been inducted into the Tennessee Hall Of Fame and recently returned from a glider competition in Australia.

As a teenager, Sarah started flying in a Quicksilver MX ultralight in Canada. She had a love for aviation and spoke of her ability to get six rides in six airplanes in one day at a fly-in at Arlington claiming she flew everything but the parachutes. She felt a great pioneering spirit and wanted to do something great in aviation and felt that she had been born in the wrong century.

She got her license and purchased a Piper Vagabond that she still has today. Taking passengers was great fun but her first 500 km flight (310 miles) gave her a sense of pioneering in aviation, that sense of overcoming adversity.

Sarah came to Tennessee for an accounting job and started flying the tow plane in Chilhowee and later became the airport owner. She later got her Instructor, A&P as well as IA. Now she is also the Designated Pilot Examiner (DPE) and will give you the final testing.

They have 3 two seat trainers and a single seat glider. She even has a Schweitzer 2-32 three seat glider. She invites you to visit. Powered aircraft are allowed with the caveat that Gliders work the landing patterns on the west side of the runway and powered aircraft fly on the East side between the ridge line and the runway. Remember that Gliders have the Right of Way. The field is 2600 feet sod, and radio is: 122.9.

Remember that not all gliders have radios (no electrical system) so it would be polite to telephone in advance to say that you are coming.

Twenty minute rides are available for \$99, and thirty minutes for \$139. Please visit www.chilhowee.com for more information.JASON ARNOLD is the husband of Sarah and flies the tow plane. As a glider pilot, he too shares flying with the Hawks and thermal together. He has become an Apprentice Falconer, requiring two years of study with a written test that requires 80% to pass and has more questions than the FAA written.

Getting cutoff in the pattern

A number of Chapter 17 members have expressed concern over being cutoff while on approach to land when participating inFly-ins. Not only does it violate rules and procedures, but it is quite dangerous and can lead to mid-air accidents.

There are a number of causes.

- 1. Poorly designed or documented procedures for fly-in approaches to land.
- 2. Procedures are not managed or enforced by the event
- 3. Procedures are not known or not adhered to by pilots.

Poorly designed and inadequately documented procedures can be rectified through feedback to the flair sponsor. But this an after the fact solution.

Managing or enforcing the event procedures can be accomplished through having an air boss participate a the event.

So if you are in a situation where it appears you are near a bee's nest being cutoff by other aircraft, and lots appear not to be following established procedures, **stay vigilant and communicate with local air traffic**, and make a decision to either land or forego the event. Then report the situation to the event spon sor.

Welcome to a New Year and hopefully more great aviation adventures! The date has been set for YE 2019 at Knoxville Downtown Island Airport, KDKX. The people of the Knoxville Metropolitan Airport Authority (MKAA) at KDKX are always supportive of Chapter 17 and we are planning for another event. Please join us as a volunteer for ground and/or air support on May 11, 2019 (rain date May 18, 2019). The purpose of this program is to introduce young people to aviation. We do so by providing free introductory flights with the hope of inspiring a lifestyle around aviation and/or a career in aviation. The possibilities are not limited to that of becoming a pilot. There are opportunities in aircraft maintenance, electronics, air traffic control, etc...

The basic premise is registration is from 9AM until 11AM. The 20 to 30 minute flights end around noon or after the last participant flies. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to attend as a family day. The registration forms are required to be signed by the parent/guardian before the child's flight.

The Dawn Patrol (The event)

ack in September, I attended my first Dawn Patrol Rendezvous at the National Museum of the US Air Force. Up to t point, I had received several emails over the years notifying me that previous events were coming and I always planne on going but something always seemed to get in the way of past gatherings. Well this time I finally committed to at

since it was the 100 year anniversary of the United States involvement in WWI. Plus, who doesn't like biplanes and triplanes flying around overhead. So with those visions flying around in my head, we headed up the road to Dayton, OH to attend the show

We arrived at the field the next day an hour before it began. The air was unseasonably cold with a strong wind blowing

directly across the grass runway. Low clouds hung over the field with the look of late winter which gave the feeling of the

"Western Front" that I have read about in the old classics we had to read in high school. As we parked, all I could think was "would the planes fly today? Would there be any action in the skies?" Standing outside the gate, guarded by armed base police, we could see the tents of reenactors and vendors all in a row along the flight line as planes were moved in one direction or a other by men with tow bars. The telling thing about how light these planes are, thus my concern with the wind, is that these men walked along at a leisurely pace dragging their planes like they were pulling a toy wagon. We stood in the parking lot with our fingers crossed, hoping they would fly, but



even if they didn't, the day's events were beginning to take shape and my first Dawn Patrol gathering was looking good.

As we entered the gates we walked over to the row of reenactor's tents and checked out the items on display and what the folks were wearing. Somehow the heavy wool clothing seamed appealing considering I was wearing shorts and a long sleeve t-shirt in

40 degree weather with a 10 to 15 mph wind blowing across the cold, damp field. Take it from me, if you attend one of thes events in the future, take a set of warm clothes.

As we progressed down the line we began to find what we had come see. The planes. There were ten or twelve biplanes parked around the field and along the flight line. I imagine that if the weather had been bette there would have been more. There were also a couple triplanes and even a monoplane thrown in to spice things up. To add



to the flair, all of the planes were painted in colorful paint schemes from both sides of the war and the pilots were dressed in what appeared to be period correct outfit

From that point, the day was filled with flights from the full scale replica aircraft for two hours followed by two hours radio controlled aircraft. This format went back and forth from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The full scale aircraft flew a triangle pattern aro d and in

front of the air museum and over the grass strip. The grass strip was marked out next to the paved runway behind the museum hangers. The radio controlled aircraft flew smaller pattern just over the runwa along the flight line. One thing that was interesting was that some of th radio controlled planes actually flew at almost the same speed as the full scale planes. Plus the RC planes were so detailed and some were built to such a large scale, that sometime you weren't sure if the planes you were looking at were full scale or RC planes. Only when one would do a loop or barrel roll did you realize that these were the smaller planes. Even then you had to take a second look.

At one point a Stearman and a Waco flew over in formation as if t see what all of the fuss was about. All I could think of was how much I wanted to see one of the German themed planes take to the skies to run them off only to be jumped by a Nieuport dropping out of the clouds. Needles s to say, I was into the event at that point.

The event also had guest speakers giving talks on airplane development during the war years, famous pilots and also American pilots in WWI. We debated listening to a few of the talks but I just couldn't stop watching the planes and walking around taking pictures.

There were also several vendor tents selling the standard show memorabilia, aircraft parts and replica guns to place on the planes. After looking at







the size of those guns, I had to wonder what had to be moved around on these planes to make the weight and balance work out before they took to the skies.

At the far end of the flight line where the RC aircraft were on display there was a large tent selling the RC kits. The RC planes were amazing with the craftsmanship and amount of detail and that went into them. Especially seeing the relatively small boxes that held the kits.

The final touches to the event were the food vendor trucks on


