

LONG on Safety

Runway Hot Spots

A "hot spot" is a runway safety related problem area or intersection on an airport, typically with a history o potential risk of collision or runway incursion, and wher heightened attention by pilots is required. An already confusing condition may be compounded by miscommunication between controller and pilot causing problems with aircraft separation and possible runway incursion. Proper planning helps avoid confusion by eliminating last -minute questions and building familiarity with known problem areas




Hot spots may be due to any mix of causes: airport geometry, ground traffic flow, markings, signage, or lighting, and human factor:

Possible areas of concern may be confusing pavement intersections, unclear pavement markings or lighting, absent signage, confusing air traffic procedures and communications. If you identify a possible area of concern, bring it to the attention of airport management, and to air traffic management at towered airport:

"Lites" Leenhouts

John R. "Lites" Leenhouts is Lakeland Florida's SUN 'n FUN President & CEO. He is a 27-year veteran of the United States Navy with a distinguished record of service as a carrier fighter pilot along with an extensive list of community involvement.

Leenhouts obtained his private pilot license in 1970 and has accumulated more than 10,000 hours as piloting various military, antique and civilian aircraft. Commissioned an Ensign in March, 1974, he was designated a Naval Aviator on August 22, 1975 at NAS Kingsville, Texas. After a distinguished 27-year career, he retired from the Navy in 2001 holding the rank of Captain. Leenhouts primarily few the A-7 Corsair, F-14 Tomcat, and the F/A-18 and holds the distinction of performing more landings (or "traps" in naval nomenclature) on an aircraft carrier than any other naval aviator in U.S. history with 1645 arrested landings.

Since his retirement from the Navy, Leenhouts worked for over ten years for the Northrop Grumman Corporation as the F/A-18 Program Manager in the Jackson-ville, Florida area. Much of his work related to modification and overhaul for the F/A-18 "Super Hornet."

In his time out of the office, "Lites" enjoys flying his 1961 Piper Comanche or 1930 Waco, driving antique British cars, or riding his Harley on the many back roads of our great nation.
